FAMILY SETS SAIL TO GLOUCESTERSHIRE DAD'S FALSE LEG TO SEND HIM ON ONE FINAL ADVENTURE!

A Gloucestershire man who died from cancer asked his family to set sail to his false leg at the spot where they spread his ashes - so he could have one last adventure.

Michael Harris, from the Forest of Dean, died aged 66 in December after a short battle with lung cancer and asked his family to send his prosthetic leg on its travels.

The family 'set sail' to the limb from Lydney Docks last month after spreading some of his ashes there on the day of his wake. The leg, which had a bottle with a note inside attached to it, was washed up earlier this week at Sand Bay and found by walker Ian Lancaster.



Michael, who used to live in France and worked redeveloping properties, was first diagnosed with kidney cancer 10 years ago. He had an operation to remove one kidney and part of his stomach.

He returned home to England and then four years ago was dealt the devastating blow that his left leg would have to be amputated due to complications following his surgery. Michael, who was a crew member in the Merchant Navy travelling the world before becoming a property developer, got his prosthetic leg two years ago.

Son Daniel said: "Dad loved travelling and had been all round the world in the Merchant Navy. He had brought a camper van and was looking forward to getting his freedom back."

Micheal, who lived in Lydney, was diagnosed with terminal lung cancer last October. On a journey home from radiotherapy treatment with son Daniel, he started talking about his funeral arrangements.

"He accepted that due to his illness he wouldn't be able to go travelling again," said 42-year-old Daniel, also from

Lydney. "He said he wanted us to take his ashes to the docks near where he lived but for us also to send his leg off around the world so he could do his last bit of travelling."

A note was written and attached to the leg explaining that Michael was off on his last travels. It also asks anyone who finds the leg to email his family with updates and a location - and to pop it back in the water so he can continue his journey.

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Forest litter picking equipment made from used NHS face masks and marine plastic pollution!

Litter picking equipment made from recycled NHS face masks and plastic waste salvaged from the sea is being deployed by the district council in the Forest of Dean.

The new litter pickers are the ultimate in green environmentally friendly equipment. School children undertaking litter picks with the Forest of Dean District Council's street warden team could soon find themselves collecting rubbish with the kit, which is made from recycled NHS face masks and marine plastics, a spokesperson said.

The new equipment, funded through the Community Builders' Fund, is just one small way the District Council hopes to encourage a future that puts the environment firmly at the centre and support more items being brought back into use.

Made in the UK, the plastic components on the litter grabbers are made from 100% recycled polypropylene sourced from the NHS or through recovered ocean plastics; the litter picking hoops, used to keep litter bags open, are made wholly from fishing gear and nets recovered from the sea."

Councillor Paul Hiett, the council's Cabinet Member for Communities and Climate Emergency, said: "Our environment is in crisis and as a society we need to step up our efforts to protect our planet and find ways that support a cleaner, greener future where people and wildlife can co-exist safely. It's believed that each year 8 million tonnes of plastic waste will enter our oceans. These plastics can entangle marine animals or be mistaken for food, both with devastating consequences. Over time plastics will also start to break down into much smaller micro plastics, invading fragile ecosystems, and even entering our own food chain. While pollution is a massive problem, we hope by supporting a process that enables more items to be rescued, recycled and ultimately reused, we're making a positive contribution towards protecting nature."

"Investing in the litter pickers not only makes sense in terms of bringing more throwaway items back into use but the fact they've been made from face masks and ocean plastic is a fantastic way to start a conversation with the young people we talk to about litter, spark their curiosity, and show them the possibilities of what can be achieved if they recycle."
