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## LONG AWAITED £9M LEISURE CENTRE HAS BEEN APPROVED

The eagerly anticipated leisure centre, given the green light by the Forest of Dean District Council, symbolises a major investment in community health, wellness, and engagement within Gloucestershire. Set to transform the Speedwell building at Five Acres, near Coleford, into a vibrant community hub, this project includes the construction of a cutting-edge multi-purpose sports and performance hall, showcasing the council's commitment to fostering active lifestyles and cultural enrichment.

Key to this development is the creation of a seamless integration between the historic Speedwell building and the new sports facilities through a striking glazed atrium, designed to be a welcoming space for social interaction and community gatherings. This architectural feature not only enhances the aesthetic appeal of the centre but also symbolises the transparent and inclusive approach taken in its planning and execution.

Facilities are meticulously planned to cater to a broad spectrum of activities and interests. From a café offering a convivial atmosphere in the atrium to state-of-the-art fitness areas, including a multigym and studio spaces for dance and performance arts, the centre promises to be a cornerstone for community health and creativity. The inclusion of office and meeting spaces, along with Hartpury College's dedicated rooms, further demonstrates the centre's role as a multifaceted educational and leisure resource.

Councillor Tim Gwilliam's reflections on the project underscore the transformative power of community activism and partnership between local governance and residents. This leisure centre stands as a beacon of achievement, illustrating how persistent advocacy and collaborative effort can lead to the realisation of long-held community aspirations.

The design incorporates environmentally sustainable materials and technologies, including timber cladding that will naturally age, contributing to the centre's aesthetic harmony with its surroundings. The emphasis on renewable energy through photovoltaic panels and the comprehensive parking and cycling facilities underscore the project's commitment to sustainability and accessibility.

Looking ahead, the project lays the groundwork for further development, including sports pitches, tennis courts, and potentially a hotel, signalling a long-term vision for making the site a premier leisure and wellness destination. The council's foresight in earmarking space for a future swimming pool further signifies a dedication to expanding the centre's offerings in response to community needs and aspirations.

As Gloucestershire anticipates the completion of this landmark project, the new leisure centre at Five Acres is set to become a pivotal hub for fostering community spirit, promoting health and well-being, and enhancing the quality of life for all residents. This ambitious development not only revitalises the local landscape but also sets a precedent for future community-centred projects across the region.
